

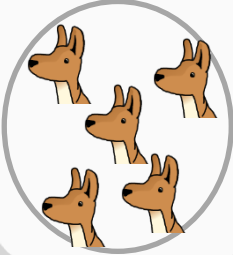
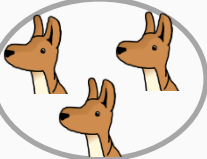

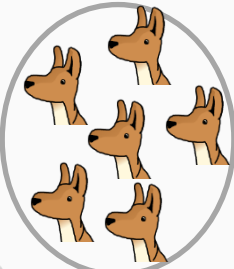
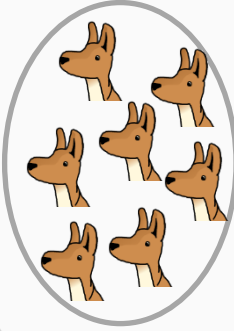
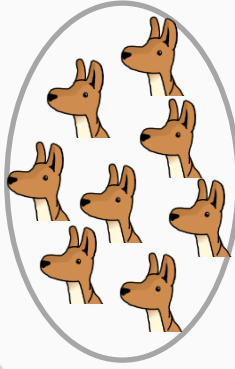
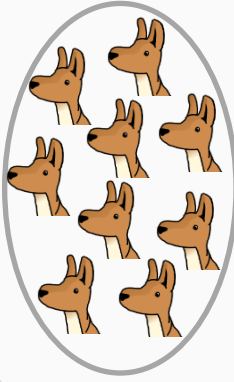


# Times tables: the 21 facts\*
